

Bellefield update presented to Hyde Park Chamber

An update on construction of Bellefield at Historic Hyde Park – at \$1 billion, the largest current in-development project in the Hudson Valley and one of the largest in New York State – was presented to the Hyde Park Chamber of Commerce on Thursday, March 23.

The multifaceted mixed-use project, being developed by Bellefield Development Partners, an affiliate of T-Rex Capital Group, LLC, is being promoted as a world-class hospitality, tourism and sustainable agri-tourism destination with residential options.

Located across Route 9 from the Culinary Institute of America, Bellefield consists of 2.1 million square feet of development. Residential space comprises 60 percent of the project and commercial space is 40 percent. The site will help preserve the region’s natural beauty by ensuring that more than half of the property’s 340 acres remain as undeveloped woods.

The presentation to the Chamber of Commerce was provided by Larry Boudreau, President of Bellefield at Historic Hyde Park Development, and Kelly Libolt of KARC Planning Consultants. They highlighted progress on the first phase of vertical construction, the Inn at Bellefield by Residence Inn, which is scheduled for completion in the fourth quarter of 2023.

Prior to the hotel’s opening, Bellefield’s Wastewater Treatment Plant will be commissioned. The presentation also went into some of the details of the PILOT (Payment in Lieu of Taxes) application adopted by the Town Board and currently being reviewed by the Hyde Park Central School District. Boudreau

Parent: Autism acceptance opens doors for everyone

As World Autism Day approaches on April 2, Jackie Mandel would like everyone to understand and focus on autism acceptance.

“Autism is not a choice, but acceptance is. Autism is not a disease, it’s a disability and society should embrace what these individuals can offer.”

Jackie and her husband, Andy, are the parents of Jonathan, “a very happy, affectionate and active young man,” who is a resident at Anderson Center for Autism in Staatsburg, about 105 miles from their home in Port Washington.

For Jackie and her family, embracing Autism Acceptance has also meant making the actual decision to place Jonathan in full-time residential care at Anderson Center.

“The decision to move Jonathan to Anderson was difficult to say the least, but our feeling was this would be the best thing for him,” said Jackie. “Jonathan has been very happy there and has been given more opportunities there than we could have ever provided him. Anderson is a wonderful place, led by extraordinary staff. Students and residents have the

opportunity to learn, grow, develop relationships, gain independence and thrive.

“The staff does not infantilize Jonathan. He is respected and treated as such. It is very comforting as a parent to see the relationships Jonathan has with the staff in his house and teachers at the school.”

Jackie terms caring for Jonathan as “an unbelievable journey that has truly opened our eyes.”

She said Jonathan enjoys being out and about and active. In the past, he has participated in the Mid-Hudson Valley Special Olympics Track & Field and Basketball Skills events. He also loves the beach, jumping in the ocean and swimming in the pool. Jonathan is very social and enjoys being with his family.

“Recently, he was with us in Massachusetts as we all attended his cousin’s wedding and Jonathan had a great time during all the festivities and danced up a storm,” said Jackie.

As parents, she said they realized when Jonathan was young that it was important to expose him to the

Renegades introduce new partner and Heritage Financial Park

So long, Dutchess Stadium. Hello, Heritage Financial Park.

The Dutch, as it was more commonly referred to, will still physically exist and be the home of the Hudson Valley Renegades minor League Baseball team as well as a series of high school and college games. However, after 30 years it will now have a new name.

In an announcement last week, the Renegades have entered into a naming-rights

agreement and will rename the stadium “Heritage Financial Park” after a Valley-wide credit union.

“In baseball terms, Heritage Financial Credit Union (HFCU) is a five-tool player, and we are honored to welcome them into the Renegades family!” said Tyson Jeffers, new General Manager of the Renegades. “From our first conversation, it was clear that HFCU shares in our fan-first, community-first culture, and is dedicated to making a difference in

Village Election results

The following are the results of Village Elections in Red Hook, Rhinebeck and Tivoli, which took place on Tuesday, March 21.

All candidates ran unopposed, and with the exception of two trustees in Red Hook, all were incumbents seeking re-election.

These new terms are effective April 1.

RED HOOK

Mayor Karen Smythe won a full four-year term with 97 votes. Smythe won a special election last year to fill the unexpired term of Ed Blundell, who resigned in 2021.

Trustees Kimberly Bradley-Rickard (80 votes) and Steven Appenzeller (84

votes) ran to fill positions open as a result of Trustees Brent Kovalchik and Declan Dwyer-McNulty not seeking re-election.

Incumbent Justice Jonah Triebwasser received 91 votes.

All terms run four years.

RHINEBECK

Mayor Gary Bassett received 234 votes. Trustees Richard Lewit and Lydia Slaby received 230 and 235 votes, respectively.

Each term runs two years.

TIVOLI

Mayor Joel Griffith received 148 votes, Trustee Peter Baldino received 138, and Trustee Bill Shilling received 135 votes. There were 152 votes total.

All terms run two years.

Hinchey bill to ban estimated billing by utility companies passes Senate unanimously

ALBANY, NY – Last week, the State Senate unanimously passed a bill authored by Sen. Michelle Hinchey to protect New Yorkers from excessive month-to-month fluctuations in their utility bills due to the use of estimated billing by utility companies. Hinchey's bill is informed by thousands of Hudson Valley residents who have experienced astronomical bill increases due to estimated utility readings, which is when a utility supplier predicts and bills a customer's power consumption based on their past usage rather than an actual meter reading for that month.

Hinchey's bill aims to curb this billing method, which frequently leads to customers being overcharged and has placed significant economic hardship on residents of her district.

"No matter who you are, a single parent or a senior on a fixed income, you should be able to budget effectively from month to month, not have your savings account unexpectedly drained by an inaccurate utility bill, as we've seen happen to countless Hudson Valley community members," Hinchey said. "Utility companies are using estimation formulas that are not based on past usage, making it impossible for New Yorkers to afford, let alone trust, their utility bills. My legisla-

tion to ban the practice will help ensure that this never happens again while bringing needed transparency and accountability to the utility industry as a whole in New York."

S1851-Hinchey would codify in law that utility companies in New York must perform an actual meter reading unless they cannot gain access to a meter due to circumstances beyond their control, including extreme weather. The bill would also require the Public Service Commission (PSC) to develop an estimation formula to be used as a utility industry standard in New York State while limiting the number of times estimated billing can be used to three billing cycles per year (down from six). Hinchey's bill sets the deadline to November 1, 2023, for the PSC to create the new billing standard, which will be informed, in part, by a comprehensive review of the estimated billing procedures used by all utility companies serving New York State. This would make public, for the first time, the estimated billing formulas of utility companies serving New York State to increase transparency and accountability to the people of New York.

The bill will go to the Assembly and then to Gov. Hochul's desk.

and Libolt also outlined the future construction schedule and how the overall project will take shape. Bellefield's next Phase, 2A, containing 12 townhouses, is scheduled to start later this year.

"The Bellefield team is pleased that the Hyde Park Chamber of Commerce welcomed this update, and we are appreciative of its support," Boudreau said. "The Chamber team shares our vision that Bellefield at Historic Hyde Park will energize Dutchess County and the entire Hudson Valley by creating a world-class hospitality, tourism and sustainable agritourism destination with residential options set amid a culinary-themed planned community."

"What a great presentation today from the Bellefield at Historic Hyde Park team. We are very excited for this project to progress and to support Phase II of the project and the PILOT application. This project will have positive benefits for the community and region for generations," said Dot Chenevert, President of Hyde Park Chamber of Commerce.

The Inn at Bellefield, with 137 rooms, is a \$52 million project being developed by T-Rex in partnership with Shaner Hotel Group, LP. It is the first of two hotels the completed development will offer. The

next phases of construction include 400,000 square feet of retail and commercial space that will include restaurants, breweries, a high-end grocer, day care, co-working space, a film production studio and agriculturally themed specialty shops. Approximately 600,000 square feet of residential space will include 344 rental units and 129 condominiums.

New York State's Mid-Hudson Regional Economic Development Council (MVREDC) and Empire State Development (ESD) have played a vital role in facilitating the project, securing \$3.25 million in Empire State Development and \$1 million in Market New York grant funds through the Consolidated Funding Application process. Bellefield at Historic Hyde Park was designated a regional priority project by the Mid-Hudson Regional Economic Development Council.

A key attraction of Bellefield at Historic Hyde Park will be an integrated residential "Agrihood," the first in the Northeast. Its vision perfectly aligns with the Hudson Valley's well-established culture of sustainability and eco-friendliness. The Agrihood's culinary shops, farm-to-table restaurants, breweries, restaurants, distilleries, special-events

barn and educational center will complement the Culinary Institute of America and surrounding region. Often referred to as America's breadbasket because of its historic production of food for the New York metropolitan market, the Hudson Valley takes great pride in its food and wine traditions. Approximately 25 million tourists a year visit the Hudson Valley – 600 percent more than Napa Valley's annual visitation of 3.8 million

tourists.

Bellefield at Historic Hyde Park also will create much-needed quality housing in a region with a substantial ongoing demand for, and a documented shortage of, quality housing. A diversity of residential product types, including rentals, condominium flats, cottages, townhouses, and single-family homes, will cater to a wide pool of potential residents and foster a vibrant community.

community as much as possible. “Obviously, there were behavioral ups and downs in the early years, but we worked through them and we feel that benefited him tremendously. Obviously, we feel very lucky that Jonathan has the personality and temperament he does and realize that we are extremely fortunate,” she said.

When Jonathan was 4 1/2 years old, Jackie said he began attending a day school for individuals with autism.

“He was there for 10 years and it was a wonderful experience for him (and us). It was there where Jonathan learned how to communicate and learn. Jonathan is non-verbal and the (instructors at) the day school recognized how critical it was for him to learn how to communicate his wants and needs,” she said. “He received a communications device, which has now morphed into an APP on an IPAD. After 10 years at his wonderful day school, we felt Jonathan would have more vocational opportunities in another setting. When he was 14 1/2 he moved into the Anderson Center and has been there ever since.”

For Jonathan, now 21, and preparing to transition into adult services, quality of life at Anderson Center has meant:

- Learning how to “hoverboard” and participating in the Special Olympics.
- Preparing to celebrate the milestone of graduation this year.
- Living in a home with other individuals who have autism.
- Not being able to see his family for quite some time during the global pandemic.
- Developing the skills needed to feel confident and able to do things for himself, despite being nonverbal.

- And weekend visits from his family, who take him to the Hanger Cafe in Lagrangeville, where small private planes are taking off and landing as he enjoys his favorite menu item - eggs in a skillet.

And for staff members at Anderson Center, it is all about their organizational mission to “optimize the quality of life for people with autism,” said Patrick Paul, CEO/Executive Director.

He said that means:

- Providing evidence-based educational, vocational and residential services to people with autism.
- Offering families an opportunity to belong to a supportive community of parents, caregivers and siblings who share a similar journey.
- Giving international scholars the training needed to set up programs for people with autism in their home countries.
- Teaching communities, groups and businesses who want to become more accommodating and gain designation as “autism supportive environments.”
- Working with institutions of higher education to prepare the next generation of professionals for roles within the field.
- And serving as “thought leaders” among a field of experts who are seeking to do all they can to enrich life for people with this neurological disorder.

With incidence rates increasing (1 in 44 people diagnosed with Autism Spectrum Disorder), Jackie reminds us that that we need to better-prepare educators for the fact that more and more individuals with autism are learning in their classrooms and that we “need to look at each person as an individual with their own set of unique characteristics.”

I am writing to share what my team and I have been working on since voters elected me to be their Assemblyman. This session, we hit the ground running by introducing my first piece of legislation, "Melanie's Law" (A3277). This bill addressed an overlooked loophole in criminal law that excludes non-immediate family members from receiving an order of protection in the case of a domestic violence. I am proud to partner with Senator Rob Rolison to address this much-needed change.

When I ran for Assembly, I promised to hold Public Utilities Companies accountable; I am proud to say I am doing just that. My second bill is the "Public Utilities Accountability Act" (A4980). This bill holds utility companies accountable for their reckless and predatory billing practices. This legislation would require overcharges to be refunded at the customer's discretion via check or credit.

My office continues to work tirelessly to address the needs of our district and solve constituent cases. Ribbon cutting, tours, job fair at BOCES Salt Point campus April 15

Dutchess BOCES will celebrate the completion of its "One Campus" Capital Project on Saturday, April 15 and the public is invited to tour the schools and visit a job fair after a ribbon cutting.

The Dutchess BOCES Board of Trustees, the agency's leadership, and students will cut a ceremonial ribbon at 9:30 a.m. at the new shared entrance for the Alternative High School and the Career and Technical Institute (CTI) located at the back of the building. From 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. an expo and open houses will take place at all schools, including the Salt Point Center (SPC).

SPC serves students pre-K through eighth grade by providing special education and a variety of support services. The school will host a sensory program in the gymnasium and have information about programming available for visitors. Staff will be providing building tours and sharing information about the trade skills learned at CTI and the supports and inde-

pendent study offered at the Alternative High School.

Student work will be on display at all schools and information about the Adult Learning Institute, the GED testing site and other divisions will be provided to those who are interested.

Dutchess Community College will be hosting an "Instant Admissions" table for current high school students.

The job fair, which will be held in the new Conference Center, will feature more than 20 community partners who are now hiring. Included will be Onsemi, Central Hudson, Nuvance Health, NYS Corrections and Community Supervision, RK Roofing, Williams Lumber and Home Centers, Veith Electric, Schatz Bearing Corporation, DS Electric and the Gap, Inc.

The Board of Trustees will also be holding its annual meeting and regular April meeting at 11:30 a.m. and 1 p.m. respectively. Both are open to the public.

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Community involvement is key element in Renegades – Heritage FCU partnership

When new Hudson Valley Renegades General Manager Tyson Jeffers set out to find a naming-rights partner, he was given two stipulations.

One was to select a truly local company. And two, it had to be already invested in the area and known for its community involvement.

“When we started this process of finding a naming-rights partner, we were looking for a five-tool partner, a partner that wanted more than just putting their name on the side of the building,” Jeffers said.

Heritage Financial Park will replace the name of Dutchess Stadium outside the building. Terms of the agreement between the Renegades and Heritage Financial Credit Union were not disclosed.

Technically, it is still a county park and the county will have an active role in helping to run the facility. But the county won’t be on the hook for as large a financial burden as it has in the past 30 years. And the Renegades get another source of

revenue. Naming-rights deals can be lucrative or, at the very least, help defray expenses for a franchise.

The Renegades, as with every minor league team’s arrangement with their Major League parent, as per the contract agreement with them, must have certain standards in place. For instance, the Renegades are in the midst of putting padding on the outfield walls, building a new visitors clubhouse and renovating the home clubhouse and adding a batting cage.

Not only will the Renegades benefit, but so will high school teams like Beacon and Roy C. Ketcham and even Marist College, that call the stadium home on occasion.

“Once we met with Heritage Financial Credit Union, we felt an immediate connection and that their community-focused culture and their mission directly aligned with ours,” Jeffers said. “This led to many meetings ending with a beautifully-crafted partnership that will rename the facility to ‘Heritage Financial Park’ and have exponential community impact.”

New manager Santos leads Renegades field, support staff

The New York Yankees have announced their minor league field and support staff for Hudson Valley Renegades for 2023. Sergio Santos will take over as the manager of the Hudson Valley Renegades, the Yankees High-A affiliate.

Santos takes over as the 18th manager in team history and third in three years during the Yankees era. He is joined on the coaching staff by Pitching Coach Preston Claiborne (1st season), Hitting Coach Kevin Martir (1st season), and Defensive Coaches Rob Benjamin (2nd season) and Derek Woodley (1st season).

They will be joined by Athletic Trainer Brandon Rodríguez (1st season), Strength Coach Isiah McDonald (1st season), Clubhouse Manager Ryan Shute (3rd season), Video & Travel Assistant Carlos Cespedes (1st season), and Advanced Scouting Analyst Matt Wells (1st season).

“I’m extremely excited for the start of the season,” said Santos. “I know our staff is top-notch, and I’m looking forward to the players who are going to be here and experience the Hudson Valley. I hope everyone comes and supports the Renegades because it’s going to be a great year.”

Santos begins his second season coaching in the Yankees organization in 2023, and his first with the Renegades. In 2022, he managed the FCL Yankees to the Florida Complex League Championship, defeating the FCL Rays 2-1 in the FCL Championship Series. The team finished with a 38-17 (.691) record, winning the FCL North by 10.0 games and posting the second-best record in the league. Prior to joining the Yankees, Santos was a coach and mentor at the MLB Urban Youth Academy in Compton, California from 2018-22.

Born in Los Angeles, Santos was selected in the first round (27th overall) of the 2002 First-Year Player Draft by the Arizona Diamondbacks out of Mater Dei High School in Santa Ana, California. He spent the first seven seasons of his professional career as a shortstop before con-

verting to pitching in 2009. He made his Major League debut on April 8, 2010 with a scoreless relief inning for the Chicago White Sox. Santos pitched for six seasons in the majors with the White Sox (2010-11), Blue Jays (2012-14), Dodgers (2015) and Yankees (2015).

Santos racked up a career-high 30 saves in 2011 with Chicago, and across 194 career MLB appearances posted a 3.98 ERA and 11.2 strikeouts per nine innings. During the 2011 season, Santos established a new Major League record by posting 25 straight scoreless appearances on the road to start the season, a record that had previously been held by Mariano Rivera. His time in the majors with the Yankees lasted only 3.0 innings across two appearances before an elbow injury ended his season.

Sheriff's Office to conduct boating safety courses

Dutchess County Sheriff Kirk A. Imperati announced that over the next several months, Marine Patrol Deputies will be instructing New York State Safe Boating Courses for the purpose of educating boaters and assuring safe and lawful operation of all vessels in compliance with Brianna's Law.

Brianna's Law is named after Brianna Lieneck, who was an 11-year-old girl from Long Island, NY that was killed in a boating accident in 2005. Brianna's Law phases in mandatory completion of a New York State Safe Boating Course for all persons who operate motorized vessels. Failure to comply with this law could result in a fine between \$100 and \$250.

Any person wishing to operate a vessel who is born on or after Jan. 1, 1983 will need a Boating Safety Certificate as of 2023. Those born on or after Jan. 1, 1978 will need a Boating Safety Certificate beginning in 2024. All operators of motorized vessels, regardless of their age, will need a Boating Safety Certificate beginning in 2025.

Each NYS Safe Boating Course offered by the Dutchess County Sheriff's Office will be conducted in two 4-hour sessions on a Friday evening and follow-

ing Saturday morning. Attendees must attend both sessions of the course for successful completion. All courses will be held at the Dutchess County Sheriff's Office Law Enforcement Center Community Room at 108 Parker Ave in the City of Poughkeepsie on the following dates and times:

In a remarkable statewide effort, the 13 downtown historic performing arts centers from Jamestown to Poughkeepsie have come together to form Alive Downtowns! This coalition, having met virtually since the start of the pandemic, is seeking an ongoing \$20 million in operating support from the state. Their goal is to encourage New York lawmakers to think of the upstate historic theatres as they do zoos and aquariums and public television statewide - organizations that have great public benefit to the citizens of the state.

Alive Downtowns! members are Bardavon 1896 Opera House (Poughkeepsie), Clemens Center (Elmira), Palace Performing Arts Center (Albany), Proctors Collaborative (Schenectady, Albany, Saratoga), The Reg Lenna Center for the Arts (Jamestown), Rochester Broadway Theatre League's Auditorium Theatre (Rochester), Shea's Performing Arts Center (Buffalo), The Smith Center for the Arts (Geneva), Stanley Theatre (Utica), State Theatre of Ithaca, Syracuse Area Landmark Theatre, Troy Savings Bank Music Hall, and Ulster Performing Arts Center (Kingston).

Combined, these facilities have an average age of nearly 100 years and have been keystones to their respective downtowns for all those years. They serve over 5 million people annually including thou-

sands of students. Their aggregate budgets exceed \$100 million and their economic impacts for upstate's major downtowns conservatively exceed \$350 million.

Upstate New York's historic theaters are essential to our cities continuing attractiveness, urban education opportunities and economic viability.

John Parkhurst, Chief Operating Officer of the Rochester Broadway Theatre League commented, "The COVID-19 shutdown of nearly two years has impacted us greatly as an industry. We are coming back, all of us, but, frankly without this coalition it would have been much harder."

In meeting with local legislators and the Governor's office, the response has been very supportive. The coalition is grateful for that response and hopes to reach all state elected officials to assure an annual appropriation that will allow its members continue to be part of growing upstate downtowns guaranteeing accessibility for all citizens for years to come.

Chris Silva, long time Executive Director of the Bardavon 1896 Opera House in Poughkeepsie added, "This group of performing arts centers are economic, educational and cultural engines in Upstate. We are hoping the state can make a modest investment in us that will pay huge dividends."

NEWS FROM THE OLD DUTCH VILLAGE GARDEN CLUB

Busy as ... ◆◆◆ submitted by Pat Owens

Yes, we are busy as bees. So much to buzz about at the Old Dutch Village Garden Club. Our most recent meeting on March 9 had one of our own members Felice Gelman give a presentation on “All About Bees.” This well attended meeting provided the club with everything one could possibly imagine about our bee-loved bees, just short of becoming beekeepers themselves. She is also a member of the Northern Dutchess Beekeepers Club. Felice had delightful and informative slides to illustrate her talk and provided a handout, lest we forget what was said.

Foremost to realize is that of the 100 crops providing 91 percent of the world's food, 71 of them are pollinated by bees. There is an alarming decline in honeybees. I was aware of this and attempt to plant flowers, etc. that will be beneficial but there are other things going on that I did not know. For example, I know about pesticides and pollution but there is also colony collapse that usually happens to commercial beekeepers and thought to be related to the stress of transport on trucks. I did not know that bees are transported to other areas for pollination. This may be helpful to people but apparently not to bees. And, of course, there is also commercial and residential land development

and abandoned farmland returning to woodlands and thus reducing the number of flowers necessary for pollen and nectar. Did you know that some flowers are being developed to be pollenless to avoid allergies to customers? Here I would be thinking that I'm doing a wonderful thing for the bees and there is no pollen! Bummer.

Bees also have an active social life. They “dance and wiggle” to signal where they have found pollen; they “see” ultraviolet, yellow, blue and purple but not red. That surprised me. Some flowers have ultraviolet patches called nectar guides to show bees they have something to offer. I'm hoping that would help the red flowers. Ancient Egyptians kept beehives and then honey bees were brought to Europe and then to the United States.

And, then there's the Queen bee. It's good to be Queen. Unfortunately, she's laying up to 1,500 eggs a day in the spring, which sounds tiring. On the other hand, all those worker bees are busy helping and in winter they even have to surround the queen and vibrate to keep her warm. Those drones had better not act up because if food is short, they are kicked out. I guess all families have some problems. Finally, consider plants that help bees such as asters, herbs, fruit trees and

read the labels. No pesticides and wait until May when the ground warms up to rake leaves. Many insects are hibernating in there.

While you are planning for your garden this spring, consider the Annual Plant Sale of the Old Dutch Village Garden Club which will take place at the Memorial Garden across from CVS on May 20 at 9 a.m. There will be hundreds (yes) of plants and some gardening accessories and books. If anyone has an abundance of plants, please give us a call. The club would welcome them and even dig if you're not up to it. We'd love to have them at least two weeks ahead to get them into their pots and healthy for the sale. It helps if you know the name and color of

your plants.

All proceeds from the sale go to local scholarships, community projects, and to maintain civic pride and our own Memorial Garden. Feel free to call Linda Lawson at 845-399-9532. She is a wealth of information on the club and on the Plant Sale.

Our next meeting is our Anniversary Luncheon, but on May 11 we have a presentation on “Be a Better Backyard Birder” by Cathy Michael. Talk on antique bottles set April 5 in Warwick

Have you ever come across that lone bottle residing on your kitchen shelf or living room counter begging to tell a story? Today, it is often forgotten how glass bottles were once a primary method of storing and transporting substances of all kinds. Join Alex Prizgintas with the Warwick Historical Society on Wednesday, April 5, at 7 p.m., as they discuss the fundamentals behind dating and identifying antique bottles in a talk titled “Art of Antique Bottle Detecting.”

Prizgintas has been collecting bottles from the Hudson Valley for more than 10 years and served as president of the Hudson Valley Bottle Club from 2018 to 2020. His research on local bottles and bottle history has been published in the Antique Bottle & Glass Collector magazine, Marist College’s Hudson River Valley Review, and the New York Archives Magazine.

“Alex and Viktor Prizingtas truly know how to tease the story out of a bottle,” says Diane Lapis, president of the

Beacon Historical Society where this lecture was presented in March of 2022. “‘The Art of Bottle Detecting’ helps the viewer to understand markings on bottles and put them into historical context. You will never look at a bottle in the same way again: marks, dips, seams, and colors come alive after this succinct and interesting discussion.”

According to Prizgintas, these bottles are so much more than the collectible artifacts that they are often seen, and “understanding their history provides a unique glimpse into the past—as well as better insight when visiting an antique store, yard sale, or flea market in the future.”

Egg-stroinary

Two luxurious desserts for spring celebrations featuring the noble egg

In planning this year's Easter menu and looking back through some of my favorites from the past, I'm wondering if it's a coincidence or subconscious choice on my part that so many of the recipes call for eggs, which is of course fitting. I suppose I never noticed it before because eggs have always been a reliable and reasonable go-to for dishes savory and sweet and, of course, for coloring. But this year? Well, I may be rethinking that.

Never mind the goose that laid the golden egg! For the last several months, egg prices for the humble chicken variety have been almost as dear as if they were gold. And with Easter fast approaching that could mean we're in for an – I'm sorry, I have to – "eggstra" expensive holiday. Now that I've gotten the obvious pun out of the way and vow to try to refrain from anymore since it's not a laughing matter, since most likely the rise in price is due to a global outbreak of avian flu.

Avian, or bird, flu is spread by infected wild migratory birds (like ducks and geese) mingling with domestic poultry and has led to the deaths of tens of millions of chickens and other farmed birds.

This amount of fast-acting devastation has naturally driven up the price of eggs. Fewer laying hens means fewer eggs, which means higher prices.

And while we've seen a slight break in prices locally, egg prices may go up again in the coming months due to the shortages caused by Easter demand as well as the beginning of spring migration of wild birds continuing the bird flu cycle. It's certainly something to watch, so you may want to keep up to date with reliable online sources. All that said, let's move on.

Having established that eggs are pricey, what are some of the best and most worthwhile ways to put them to use? I have my favorite egg-forward recipes for sure, but I've chosen two from my repertoire that balance each other out using four eggs and are perfect for your holiday table; one uses just the egg whites and the other the yolks. That's two desserts with just four eggs. These were inspired by existing recipes I found somewhere long ago (pre-internet!), and even though I changed them from the originals, the sources of which are since lost to time, so I cannot customarily give

credit where it's due. For much the same reason, I do not have photos to share as it's been a while since last I made them. After revisiting, though, I will be making them again soon.

CHEWY FLOURLESS CHOCOLATE-PECAN COOKIES

The use of egg whites in place of flour not only gives these delightful texture – delicately crisp and crackled outside, chewy meringue-esque and fudgy inside – but also makes them ideal for Passover. But trust me, no one will even know these are gluten free! Oh! I almost forgot! You mix this up in just one bowl!

NOTES: Room temperature egg whites are best for this. Take care not to over mix the batter as it will definitely effect the texture, making the cookies stiff not chewy. You will need to line your baking sheets with parchment to prevent sticking.

INGREDIENTS

- 2 1/2 cups pecans, chopped and toasted
- 3 cups confectioner's sugar
- 1/2 cup plus 3 tablespoons Dutch-process cocoa powder
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 4 egg whites, room temperature

1 tablespoon vanilla

1 cup semisweet or bittersweet chocolate chips (optional)

METHOD

Position oven racks in the top and bottom thirds of the oven and preheat to 325 degrees. Line 2 baking sheets with parchment and set aside.

In a large bowl, sift confectioner's sugar and cocoa powder together. Whisk in salt and pecans. Stir in egg whites one at a time, then vanilla (I use a wooden spoon or fork here since the batter will get stiff and sticky), mixing just until moist and combined. Stir in chocolate chips, if using.

Drop rounded tablespoons of the batter onto prepared baking sheets (no need to flatten), about 1 inch apart. You should fit 12, evenly spaced and of equal size, on each sheet. They don't spread much as they bake.

Bake until tops are lightly cracked and shiny, about 15 minutes. Slide cookies – parchment and all – onto racks to cool.

Makes about 2 dozen cookies.

VANILLA POTS DE CRÈME

Oh custardy-puddingesque-mousse-like desserts, how I love thee! Pots de crème are kind of a mélange of all the above and so are creamy, decadent and silky smooth! I've made this version easier than most by using (great quality) pure vanilla extract in lieu of a vanilla bean. If you can afford a little splurge, you'll want to find a good one and keep it for just such special recipes. You will need ramekins (4-6 depending on size) as a deep pan to use for a water bath (or bain marie because this is so tres French).

INGREDIENTS

- 1 cup heavy cream
- 1 cup whole milk
- 1/3 cup sugar
- 1/4 teaspoon (or generous pinch) salt
- 4 egg yolks
- 1 tablespoon vanilla (good quality!)

METHOD

Preheat oven to 325 degrees.

In a small saucepan, combine cream and milk. Place over medium heat. You'll bring this just to a simmer, NOT a boil.

Meanwhile, in a medium bowl, whisk together sugar, salt and egg yolks to combine.

When cream mixture begins to simmer, stir in vanilla.

Pour a small amount of the hot cream into the egg mixture while whisking, then slowly pour in the remaining hot cream in a steady stream, whisking constantly. This tempering is key to a silky texture, preventing the hot liquid from giving you sweet scrambled eggs!

Pour mixture through a mesh strainer into a large liquid measuring cup or other bowl with a pour spout.

Divide evenly among ramekins without filling them all the way to the top.

Place ramekins in a deep baking dish

and pour enough hot water into the dish to come about 2/3 up the sides of the ramekins.

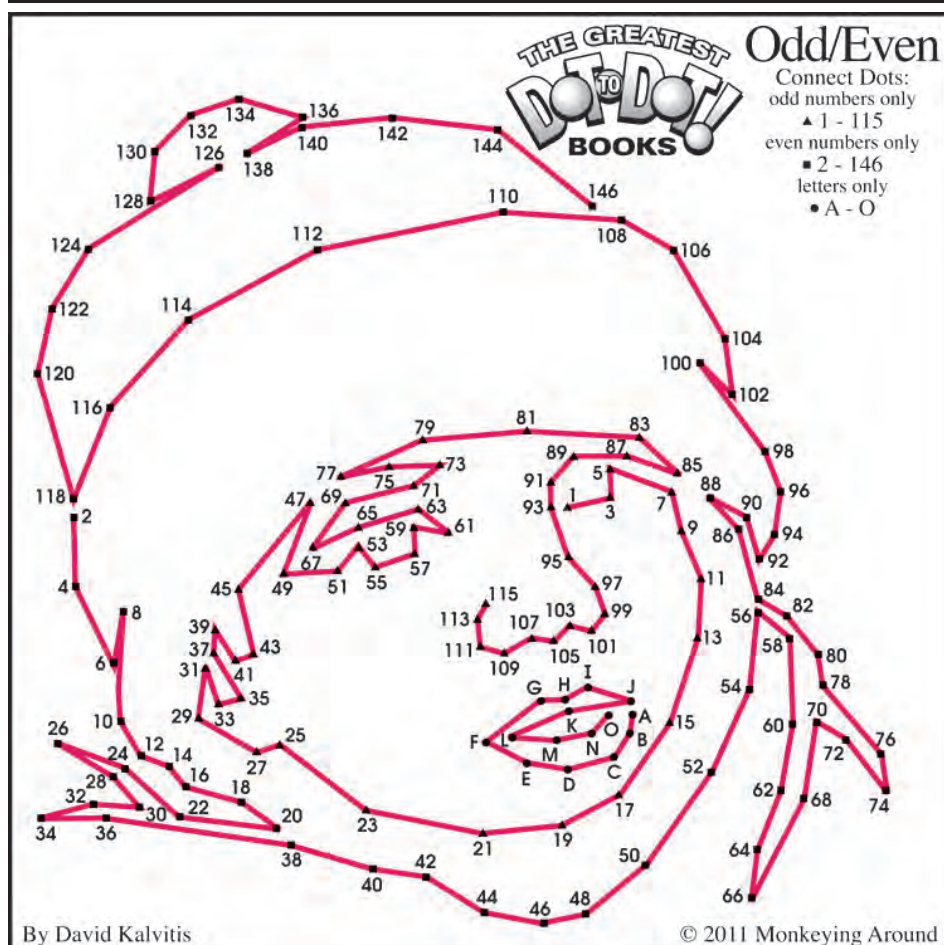
Bake until just set and they jiggle slightly when you gently move them: 4 ramekins: bake 45-55 minutes, 6-8 ramekins: 40-50 minutes. Allow to cool slightly in the pan, then transfer to a rack before chilling to fully set, at least 3 hours. Serve chilled.

Maybe we have taken the humble egg – often thought of as one of nature's perfect and once very reasonable food sources – for granted. Maybe, having watched them skyrocket in price, we now see just how valuable they are. If once it was easy not to give eggs much thought, now I think we can all appreciate how much we love and miss them.

My heart goes out to all the farmers, and certainly the birds, who play a part in all this. I think it's all the more reason to give eggs their due. What better time of year to do just that than spring? Here's to a newfound appreciation for the delectable symbol of new beginnings, that perfect, self-contained, versatile little miracle worth more than its weight in gold. Here's to the egg!



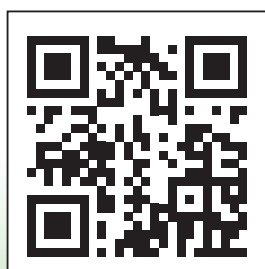
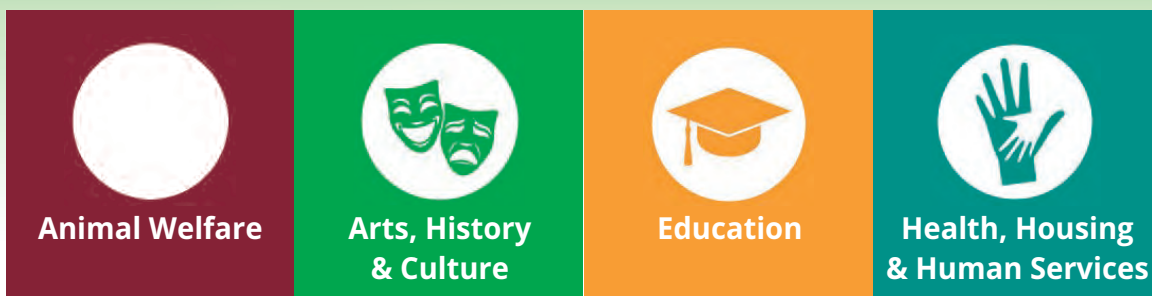
